O sing a new song to the Lord; sing to the Lord, all the earth. In his presence are majesty and splendor, strength and honor in his holy place.

inspiration. For many, the memory of that encounter with Jesus is enough to elicit a sense of renewed



A LETTER FROM FATHER

Introducing Partners in the Gospel



Dear friends,

This weekend the archdiocese of Seattle begins the public launch of *Partners in the Gospel*. Archbishop Etienne, in consultation with lay & clergy leadership at every level of governance, is inviting us to take part in a three-year process of discernment, reflection, and renewal.

Before going into the details of what this means, let us consider both the history and current state of our archdiocese. It had its beginnings with the first priests who arrived in the Pacific Northwest in 1838. Starting as the diocese of Walla Walla, it became the diocese of Nesqually, then of Vancouver, before finally becoming the diocese of Seattle in 1907 - elevated to an archdiocese in 1951. From the beginning, we have adapted to the needs of the times!

The 1950s and 1960s were arguably a peak in the history of our archdiocese, as the Catholic Church grew by leaps and bounds around the world. The port of Seattle attracted peoples from a wide swath of cultures, languages, and backgrounds - and the archdiocese responded by building many churches, most with multiple priests serving within them.

We enjoy many fruits of the efforts of those Catholics who came before us. We are rightly proud of the many ministries that continue in our archdiocese and here at Saint Mark parish. The work of our school, the outreach of our Saint Vincent de Paul conference, the beauty of our facilities, the reverence of our celebrations of Masses & liturgies, the dedication of the faithful who gather here each week - all of this is a testament to the faith that continues from the border of Canada to that of Oregon, from the Cascade mountains to the Pacific Ocean.

And yet, we are also struggling. This is clearly visible in our pews - not only in the ratio of full and empty, but in the generational gap of who is (and isn't) here. Our five bedroom rectory holds one priest - and he counts himself fortunate to be serving only one community (as opposed to the nine he served prior). Though our facilities are in great shape, our finances are suffering greatly. Moreover, a lethargy currently grips our community, making it difficult for us to find help even to simply pass the basket on Sunday, much less re-start former programs or launch new ones.

I would hasten to say, by the way, that we are not alone in these struggles, which are manifesting themselves in a variety of ways in every parish across the archdiocese.

Mindful of our history and our current circumstances, the archbishop is launching *Partners in the Gospel*. The focus is both profound and simple: to engage anew in living and proclaiming the Gospel. It is not enough to look at what once was - whether in our own lives, the life of Saint Mark, or in the archdiocese. We must also look forward to where it is Christ is calling us. (cont'd)

Partners in the Gospel has several milestones - the next is in the fall when we will be invited to provide feedback on parish families - the grouping of two or more parishes as a temporary step to becoming one parish. In early 2024 parish families will be announced, going into effect under one pastor in July of 2024. Parish families will then work together to become one parish by 2027.

As we enter this process, we recognize this moment **as a call to personal and communal conversion**. More than material goals or changes, we are being challenged to entrust ourselves to the care of the Lord. This will involve death and resurrection - death of self, new life in Christ.

I also want to emphasis a point you will hear repeated often from the archbishop: **there are no predetermined outcomes**. This is a consultative process: parishioners, pastors, and archdiocesan leadership, in union with the archbishop, discerning God's will together.

At the same time, we must acknowledge and open ourselves to change. **Our archdiocese - and Saint Mark parish - will not stay the same**. We face this reality with confidence, because Jesus will guide and accompany our efforts as we discern His call. Surrendering what is familiar and comfortable will allow us to receive the surprises and joys He is preparing for us.

What the future holds for us is not yet revealed, but I can tell you that **this is worth doing**. If we allow it, this process can transform us, building something new and exciting, enabling us to draw closer to Christ and each other as beloved sons & daughters of our heavenly father.

Rest assured that I will offer as much support and communication as I can. You are in my prayers daily, most particularly in the rosary. Remember also that every Sunday we offer our first Mass *pro populo*, that is, for the people of the parish. Let us more consciously, actively, and fully enter into prayer for ourselves and our community. Above all, let us place our trust in Christ, upon whose love & friendship we can rely.

Q: What is Partners in the Gospel?

A: Partners in Gospel is the next stage of the strategic pastoral planning effort taking place across the Archdiocese of Seattle to reinvigorate and renew our local Catholic Church.

Q: Why the focus on strategic pastoral planning?

A: The mission of the Catholic Church is at the heart of strategic pastoral planning. To achieve our mission, we must reinvigorate our parish communities which includes adapting to the needs of the faithful and to our current reality. As part of strategic pastoral planning, we continually examine our resources and how we can best use them to support vibrant, sustainable, mission-focused parish communities across the entire Archdiocese of Seattle.

Q: Why now?

Today we face many realities that are impacting parish life and making it difficult to fully live out our mission. We face an urgent yet exciting opportunity to transform parish life.

Over the past few decades our local Catholic Church has experienced a decrease of engaged parishioners, fewer priests, dwindling finances, deteriorating campus conditions and more. Here are just a few statistics:

Today the archdiocese has 80 diocesan priests for 174 locations by 2036, we estimate we will only have 66 diocesan priests, an 18% decrease. (We also have fewer seminarians and fewer lay ministry leaders.)

While the overall population of the Archdiocese of Seattle is growing, registered households are declining, along with Mass attendance baptisms, first communions, marriages in the Church and parish giving:

- From 2010 to 2019, Mass attendance as a percentage of total registered parishioners declined from 40.7% to 35.5%.
- Between 2010 and 2019 baptisms declined 30% and weddings declined nearly 19%.

Currently 67% of parishes operate with a financial deficit (excluding extraordinary income which is income apart from Sundays and Holy Days)

Overview

As Catholics, we are called to deepen our relationship with Christ, and as missionary disciples, to invite others to grow in their relationship with Christ. We do this in many ways — one of which is through the local parish community. Our parishes are the primary way most Catholics stay connected to their faith and each other. The model of parish life also allows for great flexibility in meeting the needs of Catholics at different times in history.

Today we face many realities that are impacting parish life and making it difficult to fully live out our mission. We face an urgent — yet exciting — opportunity to transform parish life — and the faith of all those who live here.

Pope Francis calls us to "read the signs of the times" while adapting to both the needs of the faithful and to historical changes.

While there is no predetermined outcome for this strategic pastoral planning effort, together we will be praying to the Holy Spirit to guide our efforts so that we can support our mission to encounter, accompany and live the joy of the Gospel.

We are not the first diocese with the courage and the will to be creative with the structure of parish life. Many dioceses have gone before us and have provided models and lessons for how we too can use our limited resources to enhance the Catholic parish experience in the Archdiocese of Seattle.

Archbishop Etienne has appointed a team to lead this strategic pastoral planning work, which will bring most parishes together into a new family structure with two or more other parishes. The pastor, parish leaders and parishioners of the new parish family will determine how they will best join together to carry out the mission of the Church as one parish.

Here is a timeline of the key milestones for Partners in the Gospel:

• January 2023: Public launch

• Fall 2023: Invitation to provide feedback on parish families

Early 2024: Final parish family structures announced
 July 2024: Parish families go into effect with one pastor

• 2024–2027: Parish families journey together to become one parish
