

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WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

Behold, the Lord, the Mighty One, has come; and kingship is in his grasp, and power and dominion.

Cf. Mal 3: 1; 1 Chr 29: 12

The story of the three kings is one that is rich in symbolism. The history of the star, the prophecies that led to this moment, and the foreshadowing of Christ's saving work made present in the gifts He receives as an infant - there are many treasures to mine in this relatively brief passage. I encourage you to take some time to read various reflections and commentaries on it all.

At the same time, there is a simple question for us to consider: would I have done this?



While we often cast ourselves as the hero of our own story (or at least a sympathetic character!), this is truly above and beyond. A lifetime of dedication to

discerning the time & place of God's work, a dangerous journey, outrageously expensive gifts, and the real possibility that they would be killed for not betraying the child they found. They gave so much - simple to see the Christ.

I think of the many times I balk at much smaller sacrifices while eagerly pursuing things of much lesser value. So often my priorities are far from what they should be.

Let us take this final week of the Christmas season to ask the Lord to renew or dedication to His service. May we be re-oriented towards Him, that in matters large or small we may always put Jesus above all else. The annual epiphany blessing with chalk is a long-standing tradition that has been experiencing a renewal in popular Catholic imagination and practice.



Though simple in both its prayer and action, this blessing is a conscious act of one's home - calling on God to help us to be ready to greet any visitor. As Mary & Joseph greeted Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar, we hope to be ready to greet those who come from distances far and near, receiving them with joy and making them welcome in our homes.

This Tuesday, January 5, we celebrate **Saint John Nuemann**. A priest who left his home of Bohemia (now the Czech Republic) he came to America. He was ordained in New York and eventually joined the Redemptorists, became a missionary, and was tapped to become the bishop of Philadelphia. He led that diocese for eight years before his sudden death of a heart attack at the age of 48.

A strong proponent of Catholic schools and an ardent devotee of the Eucharist, he was canonized by Pope Paul VI in 1977.

Epiphany house blessing with chalk

It has been a tradition in the Catholic Church to bless chalk at the Masses for Epiphany, using the blessed chalk as part of blessing one's home in the New Year.

The home blessing can be done as follows: Use the blessed chalk to write:

20+C+M+B+20

above the doorways: 20XX for the year ('XX' being this year's number); C, M, B for the 3 Magi – Casper, Melchior, and Balthasar – and for Christus Mansionem Benedicat, Latin for "May Christ Bless this House."

As you are writing, pray one of the following prayers aloud:

May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find Christ living among us; and may we seek and serve, in everyone we meet, that same Jesus who is Lord, forever and ever. Amen.

or

Lord God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only-begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who inhabit it. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others may reflect your love. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

or

Lord our God, bless this household.

May we be blessed with health, goodness of heart, gentleness, and the keeping of your law. We give thanks to you, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, now and forever.

Amen.

The family exists at the heart of all societies. It is the first and most basic community to which every person belongs. The early Church expressed this truth by calling the Christian family a domestic church.

There may be families who do not understand or believe they are a domestic church. Maybe they feel overwhelmed by this calling or unable to carry out its responsibilities. Perhaps they consider their family too "broken" to be used for the Lord's purposes. But remember, a family is holy not because it is perfect but because God's grace is at work in it, helping it to set out anew every day on the way of love.

An Epiphany Reflection

A reflection from Our Catholic Prayers' website: Christmas may come but once a year but the season does not end in the Church's liturgical calendar on December 25th. After all the activity leading up to Christmas day, we get more time afterwards to reflect on the wonders of the Incarnation.

Think of it! God first assumed a human nature to save us from our sins, most vulnerable, as a little baby in a stable in a cave in Bethlehem. Being born in such humble circumstance Jesus wished to hightlight for us how much he values true humility.

The Three Wise Men who followed the Star of Bethlehem heralding our Lord's birth are referred to as Magi in Matthew's Gospel. Magi is a word for astrologers although tradition associates these men with royalty. The Magi arrived in Jerusalem, thinking that would be the most logical spot to find the long awaited Messiah, but when they got there they found...nothing. He was not born in a Temple or a palace but in a manger; they had miles yet to go.

he Eucharist commits us to the poor. Recent popes have made the link between Eucharist and charity abundantly clear. Pope St. John Paul II reminded us to keep our spirituality grounded, to "reject the temptation to offer a privatized and individualistic spirituality which ill accords with the demands of charity." In his letter for the Year of the Eucharist, he wrote: "We cannot delude ourselves: by our mutual love and, in particular, by our concern for those in need we will be recognized as true followers of Christ. ... This will be the criterion by which the authenticity of our Eucharistic celebrations is judged." Pope Benedict XVI reiterated the essential link between worship and service, between Eucharist and charity: "'Worship' itself, Eucharistic communion, includes the reality both of being loved and of loving others in turn. A Eucharist which does not pass over into the concrete practice of love is intrinsically fragmented."

As we work to strengthen our Eucharistic celebrations and to deepen our Eucharistic spirituality during the months to come, let us also commit ourselves to truly authentic Eucharistic celebrations, which overflow in the concrete practice of love through service to the poorest and most vulnerable.
