


WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

After the Lord was baptized, the heavens were opened, and the Spirit descended upon him like a dove, and the voice of the Father thundered: This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased. Cf. Mt 3: 16-17

Below is one of my favorite images of the baptism of Christ. I find that the image captures a sense of Christ's baptism that may not be entirely apparent at first: the great vulnerability that Jesus presents to John and us.

There is the physical vulnerability: the Jordan

human body as He inaugurates baptism for all.

More profound is the humble vulnerability in how Jesus presents Himself to receive a sacrament for which He personally has no need. He does so on behalf of humanity, with whom He has forever united Himself.

The Beloved Son of God comes not to glorify Himself but to help us receive the Father's love. Joined to Him in baptism, made one in the Eucharist, He wants to glorify us so we also know that we are God's beloved children.

Last month I started a bulletin series to address common questions & concerns about COVID-19 vaccines. At the time of writing, there had not been any official publications from Rome or from the bishops.



Since then, the Washington State Catholic Conference, the USCCB, and Rome have all weighed in - each offering support of receiving the available vaccines, albeit with some important considerations & reflections.

Their writings and commentary are too much to include here, but they are all worth reading. My series will continue to be published in the bulletin, but I hope you will take the time to read these most recent publications from our bishops and from Rome. These have been given to us to assist in our understanding of our freedom & responsibilities with vaccines.

WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

Dear friends,

Reassured by the Church that remote mediate material cooperation in evil is morally licit - that we may indeed take vaccines - we come to the question of whether or not we should actually take them. To this, the Church

"On the other hand, the moral obligation to guarantee the vaccination coverage necessary for the safety of others is no less urgent, especially the safety more vulnerable subjects such as pregnant women and those affected by immunodeficiency who cannot be vaccinated against these diseases."

"While the commitment to ensuring that every vaccine has no connection in its preparation to any material of originating from an abortion, the moral responsibility to vaccinate is reiterated in order to avoid serious health risks for children and the general population."

has a nuanced but firm 'yes'! We have a moral responsibility to vaccinate not only in care for ourselves but for the safety of others, particularly those who are most vulnerable in society.

The Church is careful not to require any particular vaccine - and indeed allows for the varying calls of conscience among the faithful. The document Dignitatis Personae reminds us that "Of course, within this general picture there exist differing degrees of responsibility", prompting careful discernment in these decisions though always attentive to the health of the most vulnerable. Through the Pontifical Academy for Life, the Church reminds us that there is a moral obligation to guarantee the vaccination coverage necessary for the safety of others.

In short, we may not claim a blanket exemption from participating in the work of safeguarding others, though we rightly discern how we will do so with each vaccine. Given the nature of vaccines - that the more people are vaccinated, the more all are protected (even those who can not be vaccinated) - the Church strongly encourages all to receive vaccinations where possible so as to contribute to the health of all those around us. May we pray for wisdom in how we do our part.





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And to be Christ's Body is to carry on the mission of Christ in the world.

hen the Church celebrates the Eucharist, it is not the bread and wine alone that are transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. We must be transformed as well. When we present our gifts of bread and wine, along with any collection, we symbolically place ourselves upon the altar, that we may become (along with the bread and wine) the Body of Christ. When we receive the Body and Blood of Christ, we become what we receive — we are incorporated into Christ's Body. St. Augustine said to his congregation, "So, if you want to understand the body of Christ, listen to the apostle telling the faithful, You, though, are the body of Christ and its members (1 Corinthians 12:27). If it is you that are the Body of Christ and its members, it is the mystery meaning you that has been placed on the Lord's table; what you receive is the mystery that means you."

And to be Christ's Body is to carry on the mission of Christ in the world. This mission at its core is to proclaim the Word of Christ, to celebrate his sacraments, and to extend his love through lives of charity.
