WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

Like newborn infants, you must long for the pure, spiritual milk, that in him you may grow to salvation, alleluia.

Happy Easter! I hope that this octave of Easter has been filled with joys and blessings and that the remaining Easter season continues to bear fruit for you and your loved ones.

As we conclude the octave of Easter, we celebrate Sunday of Divine Mercy and I have a bit of a confession to make: I've never been terribly fond of this celebration. The image of Christ is not one that I find particularly appealing - Jesus seems far too soft, not at all

the ideal of strength & glory that I expect.

Moreover, the phrase at the base of the image is one that I find incomplete. More accurate to my experience is a small, but critical edit: "Jesus I trust in You.... most of the time....sometimes....



kind of."

I am consoled in the knowledge that this is the struggle of most Christians, even from Jesus' early ministry. He wasn't the conquering hero nor the scrupulous lawgiver they expected - He was meek towards sinners, bold in His mercy.

And that's what we celebrate today: that Christ is patient and merciful! He will gently build us up so that we might - little by little - truly trust in Him, without caveat or hesitation.

A plenary indulgence is available for the occasion of Divine Mercy Sunday. Although we will not be holding any formal event this year for the occasion, it is nonetheless still possible to receive this grace for yourself, a deceased person or all the souls in purgatory.

Simply recite the Our Father and the Creed in the presence of the Eucharist (exposed in a monstrance or reserved in the tabernacle) adding a devout prayer to the merciful Lord Jesus such as, 'Merciful Jesus, I trust in you!'.

The usual conditions for plenary indulgences also apply (confession & holy communion within 20 days, praying for the Holy Father's intentions and no attachment to sin.

Proclaiming the Year of the Family Part II

Pope Francis established the Year of the Family to help strengthen faith and live God's joy more fruitfully in family life. The Year of the Family began on March 19, 2021, on the Solemnity of St. Joseph and will conclude on June 26, 2022, on the occasion of the tenth World Meeting of Families in Rome with the Holy Father.

We can celebrate without traveling to Rome!

Pope Francis' five goals for The Year of the Family

- 1) Share the content of the Apostolic Exhortation Amoris Laetitia more widely.
- 2) Proclaim that the sacrament of marriage is a gift that contains in itself a transforming power of human love.
- 3) "Evangelize and catechize inside the family" (AL 200).
- 4) Foster awareness to young people about the joy of family life.
- 5) Broaden the vision and scope of the family, including married couples, children, young people, the elderly and situations of family fragility. In response to this, Pope Francis instituted a Church-wide celebration of a World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly. Beginning in 2021, it will be held on the fourth Sunday of July, close to the liturgical memorial of Saints Joachim and Anne, the grandparents of Jesus.

Year of the Family Prayer

Jesus, Mary and Joseph, in you we contemplate the splendor of true love; to you we turn with trust.

Holy Family of Nazareth, grant that our families too may be places of communion and prayer, authentic schools of the Gospel and small domestic churches.

Divine Mercy Sunday

Today is Divine Mercy Sunday. We are familiar with the message and devotion: That God loves us and He wants us to recognize that His mercy is greater than our sins.

A-Ask for His Mercy. God wants us to approach Him in prayer constantly, repenting of our sins and asking Him to pour His mercy our upon us and upon the world. **B**-Be merciful. God wants us to receive His mercy and let it flow through us to others. He wants us to extend love and forgiveness to others just as He does to us. **C**-Completely trust in Jesus. God wants us to know that all the graces of His mercy can only be received by our trust. The more we open the door of our hearts and lives to Him with our trust the more we can receive.

This message and devotion to Jesus as The Divine Mercy is based on the writings of Saint Faustina Kowalska, a young Polish nun with little formal education and from a poor family. Because of her background, and having only had three years of formal schooling, she was given the humblest tasks in the convent, usually in the kitchen or the garden. She received extraordinary revelations-or messages-from our Lord Jesus. In obedience to her spiritual director, she wrote a diary recording the revelations she received about God's mercy. Even before her death in 1938, the devotion to The Divine Mercy had begun to spread throughout the world.

Saint John Paul II canonized Sr. Faustina in 2000 making her the first saint of the new millennium. Speaking of Sr. Faustina and the importance of the message contained in her diary, the Pope called her "the great apostle of Divine Mercy in our time".

Today, we continue to rely on St. Faustina as a constant reminder of the message to trust in Jesus' endless mercy and to live life mercifully toward others. We can turn to her in prayer and request her intercession.




