The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, or Corpus Christi Sunday, is a fitting capstone to our entry into Ordinary Time. Though we have been in this season for a full two weeks, this celebration reminds us that we are sent into the world by God with the greatest of sustainance: Christ Himself.

There is a temptation to minimize the reality of the Eucharist, to say that it is 'just' a symbol or that it is primarily about communion. The crazy thing is that these dismissals are selfdefeating!

Unlike a picture, which only represents and reminds us of what it portrays, a symbol makes actually present what is portrayed. Whenever we celebrate the Eucharist, Jesus is **actually** there! It's not just a picture or a sign, its Him we eat His Body and drink His Blood.

If that makes us uncomfortable, good! Were this anything other than a free gift given for an absolute necessity, it would be horrific. But it is a freely given gift. And we desperately need the nourishment that this gift alone can offer.

What does it mean that I eat, drink, and swallow the Body & Blood of Christ? How am I preparing myself to be properly disposed so as to receive Him worthily? This celebration invites us to take seriously the gift we receive, so that we might never take it for granted but instead receive the Lord with due reverence and thanksgiving. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is a devotion that the Church heartily encourages in the lives of the faithful. Clerics and laity alike are called to spend time in prayer, and there is no better prayer than with the Lord Himself!





What is the Difference Between a Catholic and a Protestant Bible?

Have you ever wondered what is the difference between Catholic and Protestant Bibles? Both Bibles include 27 books in the New Testament. Protestant Bibles have only 39 books in the Old Testament, however, while Catholic Bibles have 46. The seven books included in Catholic Bibles are Tobit, Judith, 1 and 2, Maccabees, Wisdom, Sirach, and Baruch. Catholic Bibles also include sections in the Books of Esther and Daniel which are not found in Protestant Bibles. These books are called the deuterocanonical books. The Catholic Church believes these books to be inspired by the Holy Spirit.

ST. JOSEPH Unconditional Acceptance



ven through Joseph's fears, God's will, his history and his plan were at work. Joseph, then, teaches us that faith in God includes believing that he can work even through our fears, our frailties and our weaknesses. He also teaches us that amid the tempests of life, we must never be afraid to let the Lord steer our course. At times, we want to be in complete control, yet God always sees the bigger picture....


Joseph accepted Mary unconditionally. He trusted in the angel's words.... Often in life, things happen whose meaning we do not understand. Our first reaction is frequently one of disappointment and rebellion. Joseph set aside his own ideas in order to accept the course of events and, mysterious as they seemed, to embrace them, take responsibility for them and make them part of his own history. Unless we are reconciled with our own history, we will be unable to take a single step forward, for we will always remain hostage to our expectations and the disappointments that follow.

The spiritual path that Joseph traces for us is not one that *explains*, but *accepts*. Only as a result of this acceptance, this reconciliation, can we begin to glimpse a broader history, a deeper meaning.... Joseph is certainly not passively resigned, but courageously and firmly proactive. In our own lives, acceptance and welcome can be an expression of the Holy Spirit's gift of fortitude. Only the Lord can give us the strength needed to accept life as it is, with all its contradictions, frustrations and disappointments.

FOR REFLECTION:

- Put yourself in Joseph's shoes. What were his expectations for his life and his future? Do you think it was difficult for him to let go of those ideas? What gave him the strength to do so?
- Are there times in my life where I have had to let go and trust God unconditionally, as Joseph did? What happened when I did?
- Am I held "hostage" by expectations about what my life should be, or should have been? Have the disappointments in my life embittered me, or am I able to "accept life as it is"?

But the Liturgy of the Word is not about the past.

he Church never celebrates the Eucharist without first opening the Scriptures, the revealed Word of God. On most Sundays, the readings take us through the unfolding of God's plan, from its promise in the Old Testament, through its fulfillment in the New Testament. Through the Old Testament narratives and prophetic writings, we see God's love and care for humanity as he prepares the way for the coming of Christ. The Psalms are the prayer book of the Hebrew people, and they are our prayer book as well. The Second Reading, from the New Testament, tells of the struggles of the early Church to proclaim the saving work of Jesus. And the Gospel reading is "the high point of the Liturgy of the Word," for in the Gospel Christ himself speaks, and the Church hears in the Gospel "the very voice of her Bridegroom."

But the Liturgy of the Word is not about the past. It is about the present. When the Scriptures are proclaimed in the Church, "God speaks to his people, opening up to them the mystery of redemption and salvation, and offering spiritual nourishment; and Christ himself is present through his word in the midst of the faithful." When we allow ourselves to listen, really listen, to what the Scriptures are saying to us in our own lives and to the reality we are living in, extraordinary things can happen. When we honestly reflect on our lives and the challenges we face as a society in light of the Scriptures, we open ourselves up to God's transforming power.
