₩JMJ¥ WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

Your merciful love, O God, we have received in the midst of your temple. Your praise, O God, like your name, reaches the ends of the earth; your right hand is filled with saving justice. *Cf. Ps 48 (47): 10-11*

We hear Saint Paul proclaim that **"when I am** weak, then I am strong". This consistently makes me uncomfortable - I want to be physically, mentally, emotionally, and spiritually strong! Weakness means vulnerability and, in my experience, vulnerability means being taken advantage of, hurt, and eventually set aside. Even in those times when I can't convince myself that I am strong, it feels safest to act strong, secure and independent.

The cost of maintaining that illusion is



high. Without vulnerability - sharing my weakness with others or sharing in the weakness of others - there

is only loneliness. A lot of posing in public, a lot of self-doubt and insecurity in private. Do people care for me - or do they just love the persona that I have use to hide my true self?

The greatest moments of intimacy with family, friends, and even strangers have come when I have taken the risk of sharing who I really am: a weak man in need. C.S. Lewis once wrote that "Friendship ... is born at the moment when one man says to another 'What! You too? I thought that no one but myself".

Jesus so desires to be our friend - so much that He has taken on our weakness to help us feel safe enough to show Him ours. May we do so and discover a friendship that lasts forever.

July 4, 2021

July 6 is the memorial of the martyr **Saint Maria Goretti**. Mortally wounded while refusing to submit to her attacker, her greatest virtue was in forgiving him. On the day of her death she forgave him, wishing that he would be with her in heaven, and while



he was in prison, she appeared to him in a dream, at last prompting his repentance.

Let us pray for all victims of assault & rape, for their protection and healing, especially through Saint Maria Goretti's intercession.

Today we celebrate **Independence Day**, marking the date of the Declaration of Independence of the United States of America from Great Britain. Though the cost of the American Revolution was high, the freedom won for the thirteen colonies gave birth to the fifty states united under the belief

that we can be one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

Let us ask God to bless America, especially her leaders, that as a country we may faithfully live out our foundational values.

St. Mark Online Giving Upgrade

Our Online Giving system is getting an upgrade to a newer, easier-to-use platform.

If you currently give online you will soon receive an email with instructions on how to log-in to the new system.

Best of all, your existing payment and donation information will be migrated over so you will not have to set up your gifts again!

Keep an eye on your email for more information coming very soon.

If you are not yet giving online, please consider it! Giving online is safe and secure and has resulted in many benefits to the parish, particularly as we have weathered the pandemic.

Since we began our online giving program at St. Mark in April of 2010, total gifts have amounted to \$2,250,000. This year to date, total gifts were \$271,000, so we averaged \$22,583 each month in 2021 including all funds (Stewardship, St. Vincent de Paul, Lion's Fund, etc.) January through June.

Fraudulent Emails Alert

We have once again received reports of both staff and parishioners receiving email messages claiming to be from Father Maurer requesting that the recipient reply to the email and send gift cards. In all cases someone had set up a fake email address (this time using the free service Gmail). This fake Gmail account even used Father Maurer's name. These emails are scams designed to steal from you.

Father Maurer would never make such a request, nor would any parish staff

If you receive such an email do not reply to it!

- Block the sender.
- Do not provide personal or bank information.
- Before making a donation online of any kind, attempt to verify the legitimacy of the organization.
- Be cautious of emails claiming to contain pictures in attached files, as the files may contain viruses.
- Do not click on links contained within an unsolicited email.
- Do not provide personal or financial information to anyone who solicits contributions: providing such information may compromise your identity and make you vulnerable to identity theft.

If you think you may have inadvertently given your personal information to a scammer contact your bank and local authorities immediately. You can contact the Internet Crime Complaint Center through the FBI at <u>http://</u> <u>www.ic3.gov</u> to report suspicious email solicitations. Please know that the Saint Mark parish database has not been compromised in any way. The email addresses used by the scammer were listed on our website, available to anyone online, or they were from archived issues of our bulletin, also available to anyone online.

Death Cannot Break the Bonds of Love June 27, 2021 13th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Life on earth is temporary. Jesus draws attention to our death not to frighten us, but to give us hope, keep us connected with our loved ones and help us live lives that prepare us for heaven.

We have now reached the season of summer which starts with the solstice, the longest day of the year. Though the warmth and light of summer have begun, the days are now growing shorter and will continue to do so until December.

Our lives on earth are like this, temporary. Part of our faith is recognizing this while drawing hope from the confidence that Jesus will raise us up just as he raised the little girl in our Gospel reading.

God did not create death but he permits it in order to work a greater good. Rather than denying this reality, we recognize it with hope and trust in the risen Jesus.

Talk

Here are some reflection questions to help you have **Great Conversations** with the whole family. Let your children know death cannot break God's bonds of love:

- **Tell stories about your loved ones who have died.** Make sure that your children are familiar with the family members and friends who have gone before us and share stories from their lives.
- Pray for those loved ones and encourage your child to do the same. Let your child know that God never meant for death to break the bonds of love between us. Assure them that we can pray for our loved ones, and they can pray for us.
- Remind your child that God did not create death but overcomes it through our baptism into Jesus' resurrection. Let them know that Jesus rose again in order for us to share in his immortality through baptism.



Death does not break the "bonds of love," and our prayers for deceased loved ones are good for them and us. "It consoles us to know that those who die do not completely pass away, and faith assures us that the risen Lord will never abandon us. The Preface of the Liturgy of the Dead puts it nicely: 'Although the certainty of death saddens us, we are consoled with the promise of future immortality. For the life of those who believe in you, Lord, is not ended but changed.' Indeed 'our loved ones are not lost in the shades of nothingness; hope assures us that they are in the good strong hands of God.'"


Amoris Laetitia (The Joy of Love) #256

In this section titled *When Death Makes Us Feel Its Sting,* Pope Francis encourages us to pray for our beloved dead. He reminds us that death does not break the "bonds of love," and our prayers for deceased loved ones are good for them and us.

He also encourages us to accept death in order to prepare ourselves for it. This approach prevents us from dwelling upon the past. Instead it encourages us to do good in the present so that we may be with God and our loved ones in the future.
