

WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

- Father Jacob Maurer

Forsake me not, O Lord, my God; be not far from me! Make haste and come to my help, O Lord, my strong salvation!

Cf. Ps 38 (37): 22-23

Moses reminds the Israelites - and through them, us: "Hear, O Israel! The LORD is our God, the LORD alone!"

The Israelites - and us along with them - might instinctively respond with assurances that we worship God alone, that He is our first priority, our highest end, our best friend. How do our lives testify to or against that assertion?



What follows that proclamation is how we live out that relationship: that we love God with all our heart, with all our soul, and with all our strength.

Jesus explicitly connects what is implicit in Moses' exhortation - that if we love God, we must love each other as He love us.

Looking at our lives, maybe even narrowing our view to a given week or day, is this true for us? There are so many things that we feel we simply must do....and God is put in a back corner. An hour on Sunday fulfills our obligation to honor the Lord's day - but fulfilling the minimum is a hardly the basis of the intimate relationship the Lord desires!

What steps - however small - we might make today (and every day!) to put God first in life?

the Solemnity of
All Saints. Because it
lands on a Monday this
year, it is not a holy day
of obligation. However,
it is the hope of the



Church that we would celebrate this day!

Even in secular society we have the common celebration of All Hallow's Eve (Halloween) - after the eve's practice of dressing up and collecting candy (good on you!), consider the **9:30 am Mass** or in prayer at home.

This Tuesday, November 2, we celebrate **the Commemoration of All Souls**. Hot on the heels of All Saints, the Church reminds us to pray for all those who have died, especially those who may yet be in need of purification from the effects of sin.

We will be celebrating **Mass at 6:30 pm** at Saint Mark parish - I hope you will consider coming to pray for our beloved dead. Also

Knights of Columbus Youth Activities Poster Contest

The Poster Contest is for students ages 5-14. Students of St. Mark Catholic Classical School, public schools or home schooled are all eligible to participate. Posters must reflect the theme of **Keep Christ in Christmas**. Each poster should be the original work (including concept, layout, slogan and any images) of a single student. Each poster should be approximately 11x17 inches in size. If pastels, chalk or charcoal are used the poster must be laminated or covered with clear plastic.

Poster contest fact sheet and entry form are at the back of this bulletin and available in the school office. Posters are due in the school office by December 10 or may be turned in to a Knight at a table in the church vestibule during weekend masses of December 11 & 12.

Essay Contest

The Catholic Citizenship Essay Contest is for students in grade 8. Students of St. Mark Catholic Classical School, public schools or home schooled are all eligible to participate. The essays must reflect the assigned theme of Catholic Citizenship: Describe everyday obstacles that you may have experienced or witnessed others experiencing while living a life of authentic faith. Explain how you have overcome these obstacles and how by doing so it has helped your faith continue to grow. Please consider the meaning of virtue and think about ways in which you exemplify the virtue of Faith to glorify and reflect the nature of God. Each essay must be double spaced and in Times New Roman font. No names on essays-just staple the entry form to the back of the essay. Essays must be between 500-750 words.

The essay contest fact sheet & entry form are at the back of this bulletin & available in the school office. Essays must be in to the school office by November 15.

Dia de Muertos - Day of the Dead

Dia de Muertos (or Dia de los Muertos) is a holiday celebrated throughout Mexico around the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed (All Souls) on November 2. It is a time of remembrance of, and prayer for, deceased loved ones. The observance of the Day of the Dead has both religious and cultural aspects, not all of which are appropriate in the context of parish life, but many observances provide opportunity for evangelization on our Catholic tradition of prayer for the dead and our hope for eternal life in Jesus Christ.

The Day of the Dead as we know it today is a result of the combination of Mesoamerican traditions with the Christian understanding of remembering the faithful departed. A key part of this celebration is the preparation of an Altar de Dia de Muertos (Day of the Dead altar). In Mexico, Day of the Dead altars are found in homes, churches, public places and in cemeteries. The purpose of the altar is for family members to remember their beloved dead. Images are abundant in Day of the Dead altars. These images recall deceased loved ones but also invite us to look on death without fear, knowing that death leads to eternal life. Other traditional elements in the Altar de Dia de Muetros are: brightly colored cut paper ornaments (particularly in purple), flowers, candles, bread or other food and sugar skulls (these brightly colored skulls often bear the name of the beloved dead).

To some this may sound a bit reminiscent of St. Joseph's altars often popular among Italian-Americans. There are many traditions and many variations.

Visiting cemeteries to pray for deceased loved ones, and clean and decorate graves, around November 2 is another common tradition of Day of the Dead observances. Consider using *Order for Visiting a Cemetery on All Souls Day*, found in the Book of Blessings, Chapter 57 as a way of praying with the Church as we remember our dead. Ultimately, the Day of the Dead is a celebration of life. We remember deceased loved ones and tell stories of the lives they lived among us. And, together with the whole Church, we pray that they may enter into life with Christ.

Poster should be approximately 11x17 inches in size. If pastels, chalk or charcoal are used, the poster must be laminated or covered with clear plastic. Posters may be in color or black and white.

Each poster must be submitted with a Knights of Columbus "Keep Christ in Christmas" Poster Contest entry form.

The name and age of the person entering the poster should be included on the back of the poster.

All entries become the property of the Knights of Columbus Supreme Council. **Posters will not be returned.**

JUDGING

Judging should be done by teams composed of students, Knights, teachers, administrators, Chaplin, Pastor, etc. In keeping with the theme of giving young people the opportunity to develop their own feeling towards Christmas and our savior Jesus Christ, young people should be included in all phases of the judging process.

A **100 point scoring system** will be used to determine the winner.

30 Points: Visuals — How well do the visuals convey the message?

35 Points: Content — How thoroughly is the topic examined?

30 Points: Grammar — How well is the essay written with respect to sentence and paragraph construction?

35 Points: Style — Does the essay show creativity, imagination and development of the topic in a logical and compelling style?
