Cf. Rev. 5:12, 1:6

How worthy is the Lamb who was slain, to receive power and divinity, and wisdom and strength and honor. To him belong glory and power for ever and ever.

Of whom is Jesus King? Pilate questions whether Jesus is king of the Jews, not realizing that he is addressing not just the leader of a nation, but the King of the Universe. Before he is done, he tries to wash his hands of responsibility for Jesus' passion and death, unable and unwilling to stand with Jesus.

It is worth noting that those who crucified the saviour of the world were not pagans, militant atheists, or anti-Christians. It was the chosen



people of God who shouted down the governor from any mercy, demanding the crucifixion.

This is still true today: we too often turn away from acts of mercy and choose instead to swing hammers & nails, crucifying Christ by our sins against Him and others. We wash our hands of responsibility, telling ourselves that we are guiltless - feeling righteous, justified, or otherwise not responsible for our actions.

To allow Christ to be our King is to submit to Him, offering foremost our vulnerability and our weakness. We must surrender our desire for control, for worldly affirmation. We must turn to Him, allowing Jesus to fill every gap in our lives even when it seems impossible. Of Whom is Christ King? Of us, if we are willing to allow Him to reign in our lives. November 22 is the memorial of Saint Cecilia, patron of musicians. Though she took vows as a virgin, her parents forced her to marry a pagan nobleman named Valerian. At her wedding, she stood apart, singing to



the Lord. When the time for the marriage to be consumated, Cecilia convinced Valerian to honor her vow and be baptized, upon doing so he saw an angel standing beside her crowning her with flowers. The prefect eventually excecuted him and his brother, before also ordering Cecilia's martyrdon.

Additional times for confession are now available at Saint Mark parish during Advent! Starting this Wednesday



and continuing throughout the season (ending on Wednesday, December 23), the sacrament of reconciliation will be available every Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday evening this will be in addition to the regularly scheduled Saturday 3-5 pm confession time.

Returning to in Person Mass

The Archdiocese of Seattle became the first in the United States to suspend in-person Mass in March 2020. At that time, the coronavirus task-force was formed to develop guidance and safety protocols so parishes could safely return to in-person Mass.

Through the huge effort of staff and volunteers we quickly pivoted to live-streaming Mass while all the while planning for a return to in-person. In the summer we did just that with our outdoor Masses. Mass came back into our beautiful church that fall.

We are blessed with not only a beautiful church but a large one: We have room for you.

We know that some people will not come back until they are vaccinated or that they have underlying conditions. Some folks will not come back because they are fearful. All of these reasons are legitimate and people should not feel forced or shamed for not yet returning to in person Mass before they are truly comfortable.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Blessings and joy of our Lord be with each of you!

Thank you to everyone who has worked so hard keeping our parishes and schools running so that we can continue our mission. Despite the challenges and darkness of this pandemic, we continue to bring the light of Christ to others as seen in our outreach ministries, food banks, visits to the homebound, prayer groups, faith formation, adoration, and much more. Thank you to all the volunteers, staff, students and others who have creatively nurtured our parish communities! You are His light in our world today.

Our Coronavirus Taskforce has been tracking the latest science to inform the guidance we are issuing. As you know, this data has led to *temporary* changes to how we do things. These changes are warranted to keep people safe while not compromising the sanctity of the Mass. I remain firm in my resolve to keep our people safe — including the most vulnerable among us — so that we can continue safely celebrating the Eucharist.

Since the beginning of the pandemic, we have celebrated tens of thousands of Masses with only a handful of cases of coronavirus spread, which have been traced to people not following our safety guidance. In general, this indicates that our protocols are effectively protecting people and providing a safe environment for worship. This is something for which we can be very grateful!

As such, the general obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation (including the Saturday/vigil Mass) is to be reinstated (CIC, can. 1247) during Advent on December 8, the solemnity of the Immaculate Conception. Advent is a wonderful time to draw near to Christ. It is time to renew our faith through personal reception of the sacraments and rebuild the relationships and community life of our parishes.

As has always been the case, those who have a serious reason are excused from attending Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2181). This includes those who are ill, have significant health risk factors or care for someone who is ill or immunocompromised, as well as those who have significant fear or anxiety about contracting COVID in a large group.

I invite you to come back to church. Be a part of our family of faith. Make the Lord's Day a true celebration of the Resurrection, and a great celebration of being renewed in his life, mercy and love. I continue to pray for you, and I ask for your prayers as well. As always, I remain,

Join Archbishop Etienne, Bishop Elizondo and other Catholics from around the Archdiocese of Seattle for this festive, colorful and prayerful Advent celebration.

This Filipino tradition ushers in Simbang Gabi, a novena of nine Masses meant to honor the Blessed Virgin Mary.

It started in 1587 when the crowds at Mass on the days before Christmas were overflowing from the church so the prior of the San Agustin Acolman Convent, on the island of Luzon, Philippines, asked the Pope's permission to hold the services outdoors. The request was granted, and Simbang Gabi became a Filipino tradition.

This celebration will take place indoors on Saturday, December 11, at 11:00 am in St. James Cathedral. We can also watch the live stream at <u>St. James Cathedral, Seattle (stjamescathedral.org)</u>
