Cf. Is 45:8

Drop down dew from above, you heavens, and let the clouds rain down the Just One; let the earth be opened and bring forth a Savior.

"Sacrifice and offering you did not desire, but a body you prepared for me; in holocausts and sin offerings you took no delight."

Hebrews 10:5-6 To the average faithful Jew, this passage is both familiar and arresting. It is a quote from Psalm 40:7, so the text itself isn't alien. But this text is now being attributed not to the psalmist, but to Jesus. The meaning of the psalm is expanding from the offering of the Levitical sacrifices - offered repeatedly by priests - to the offering of a lasting sacrifice. Moreover, Jesus is both the priest AND the sacrifice.



Jesus is proclaiming the justice of God, which is familiar enough to Jewish faith, but He is also proclaiming the supreme humility of God - that God would sacrifice *Himself* on our behalf. This seems unthinkable, beyond comprehension -

to Jew and Gentile alike, if we are honest!

There is a third element at play here, one that is visible only in light of Christ's resurrection: that the Body that the God has prepared, the Body that God desires - more than holocausts and sin offerings - is the Body of Christ, the Church. This is the true Christmas message: that God ardently desires us - His delight is in you & me, in us being united to Him in Christ's Body! The question is, are we willing to offer the gift of ourselves to Him? December 19, 2021 A year ago today, on December 19, 2020, Archbishop Etienne ordained our very own



Deacon Kirk Altenhofen. As he celebrates the one-year mark of his diaconate, we give thanks for his acceptance of the office of charity and service.

We are grateful for his gifts and skills - let us pray that God may abundantly bless him as he begins year two: *ad multos annos*!

With Christmas landing on a Saturday this year, there are naturally questions about fulfilling our obligations to go to a Christmas Mass and Sunday Mass (the feast of the Holy Family). Recalling the requirement that we must attend separate Masses for each obligation, the chart below may prove helpful.

Nativity of the Lord (Christmas)	Holy Family			
Obligation may be fulfilled from the evening of Friday, December 24 through Saturday, December 25.	Obligation may be fulfilled from the evening of Saturday, December 25 through Sunday, December 26.			
 For example, one may attend: Vigil Mass of the Nativity Mass during the Night (celebrated at any time) Morning/afternoon/evening Masses on December 25 	 For example, one may attend: Afternoon/evening Masses on December 25 (even though the Mass texts will be for the Nativity) Morring/afternoon/evening Masses on December 26 			

This year, because the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God (January 1) lands on a Saturday, it is **not a holy day of obligation**.

Fourth Week of Advent: Be Still and Listen

The Virgin Mary exemplifies two essential aspects of the life of faith: the active and the contemplative. The Gospel reading for the Fourth Sunday of Advent finds the newly pregnant Mary in full active mode, traveling "in haste" to the hill country to visit her relative Elizabeth, who is pregnant with John the Baptist.

At the sound of Mary's greeting, the infant in Elizabeth's womb leaps for joy, and Elizabeth cries, "Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled."

Mary believed because she heard, and she heard because she listened. She made time to listen for the voice of God in silent, contemplative prayer, and she listened for him in the events of her life, "reflecting on them in her heart" (Luke 2:19).

Amid the bustle and excitement of these final days before Christmas, make time this week to sit in silence and listen for what God is saying to you.


