

There was a recent bit of feedback that stood out to me - good-natured but a little frustrated: "why doesn't he just tell us what to do!?" It makes me smile, because boy can I sympathize. There are any number of times when I have come to the Lord in prayer with this sentiment - especially recently!

I won't deny that I do have some ideas for the parish - things I'd like to see in the liturgical practice on Sundays & holy days, events that would be exciting to do during the year, groups that I personally would want to start or be a part of regularly. Someday I hope to even see them come to pass! But if there's one thing I have learned in my relatively brief time as a priest,

it is that it's not about me. The Lord often makes Himself known through my hopes, joys, and desires, but He works through the Church as a whole - from pope to pew.

I am currently planning some sort of leadership luncheon - potluck style - for June 11th after Mass. The hope is to have a gathering of folks looking to collaborate with like-minded parishioners on new (or old!) projects, groups, or events, to meet each other and dream together. ## Mistaken Empathy, or Don't Tell Me How I Feel! Part One

Over the past few years, researchers have begun to focus on the role of "empathy". Several best-selling authors have written about empathy as an essential trait of emotional intelligence.

#### In a broad sense, empathy is the skill of being aware of someone else's feelings and the effect of those feelings on how that person sees the world.

Empathy is a grand human moral. After all, an empathetic individual can understand not just what people do but why they do it. An empathetic person can help those they care about heal and engender support from those who feel understood.

## Mistaken Empathy, Continued

Most people like to be on the receiving end of kindness, surrounded by empathetic friends and family. And yet "empathy" is often simplified in less than useful, and sometimes even harmful ways. Too often, we are mistaken about what empathy requires and we confuse empathy with "connecting."

**Empathy requires information**. It is impossible to be empathic when you don't know much about a person or their situation. When we know little our intuitive powers fill in the blanks - and sometimes in the wrong way. For example, pretend that your dog died and it was devastating. Your wonderful friends all want to be supportive and are quick to share their own stories of loss. Indeed, many friends know the loneliness of missing a special animal companion, "When our cat died after having him 10 years, I cried for weeks..."

A more empathetic response might be to ask questions. Perhaps the sadness was rooted in the dog being hit by a car at a young age; you didn't get to have your dog for 10 years and being reminded of that could be painful

To be empathetic, you must seek to understand the other person's circumstance, not connect to your own experiences. If you do this with integrity, you may find that his or her circumstance has absolutely nothing to do with your own. If you lead by trying to establish a "connection," you may or may never understand the other person's real (and likely unique) feelings. Ironic, isn't it, that it is nearly impossible to be empathetic when your primary goal is connection with the other person?

So, to be empathetic at work, at home and in our community we can both ask questions and, at least initially, set aside the desire to connect our past experiences with those the people we are trying to support are currently experiencing.

## Taking Personal Time with God: Private Prayer

The Gospels give specific accounts of many private prayer times of Jesus. For example, Matthew 14:23 says, "When He had dismissed the crowds, he went up on the mountain by himself to pray." Mark 1:35 says, "In the morning a great while before day, he rose and went out to a lonely place and there he prayed."

Daily personal prayer is as essential to the soul as daily food and rest are to the body: Spending time with the Lord cultivates a relationship.

**Meditation** and **contemplation** are two specific types of private prayer.

#### Meditation

Meditation is a form of prayer that allows a person to reflect on God and His plan. In meditation we focus our thoughts on the Lord, Mary, the saints or an article of faith. The purpose is to deepen and increase the personal relationship with the Lord. Although the Eastern tradition of meditation involves emptying the mind of all thoughts, our Catholic tradition of meditation is the opposite; it's an active mental task endeavoring to be receptive to God's help and direction. As Christian disciples we become better informed about moral choices as we let God direct our soul.

A classic form of meditation is Lectio Divina, or the Divine Reading. Pope Benedict XVI recommended in 2005 that Catholics engage in Lecio Divina.

What follows is just an example of a step-by-step guide on this form of meditation, which uses Sacred Scripture as the source of inspiration. Think of it just as an inspiration:

**Reading (lectio):** Choose a text from Sacred Scripture and read it slowly.

**Discursive meditation (meditatio):** Read the given passage with some thought and reflection.

Affective prayer (oratio): Converse with God about the content of the Scripture passage.

**Contemplation (contemplatio):** Allow the Lord to direct your mind and heart to achieve a set outcome.

## Private Prayer, Continued Contemplation

Whereas meditation begins with the self, contemplation, which simply means in this case making oneself available to God, originates with God. We cannot conjure or summon the Lord; we can only make ourselves available and open to his divine action.

When we meditate, we are in the driver's seat. Contemplation, on the other hand, requires us to be the passenger who waits for the train to arrive.

Contemplative, or mystical prayer, is a normal part of the Christian prayer life. Anyone, not just clergy and religious brothers and sisters, can experience contemplation. Several religious orders of men and women are especially dedicated to contemplation such as the Carmelites, the Trappists and the Cistercians. Yet, throughout the Old and New Testaments we find examples of ordinary people who devote some time to this form of prayer.

Contemplative prayer usually ensues after meditation. It consists of a more passive and sublime experience. If meditation is the soul's inspired quest to discover God, contemplation is God's lifting the soul to Himself so it effortlessly basks in the divine light. The key distinction is that contemplation, in the strict sense, is purely the work of God. Meditation, though aided by God and predicated on the grace and work of Christ, is the result of us seeking Him.

A suggested model of contemplative prayer:

**Settle into a comfortable position**, taking slow, deep breaths to help quiet yourself.

Focus your attention on the image of Jesus.

Acknowledge the things that are trying to get your attention - thoughts, worries, plans, aches and pains, sights and sounds around you. Slowly, one by one, let these things go. If you feel distracted during this prayer, just quietly bring yourself back to your reflection.


In your silence and stillness, let God's Spirit within you make itself known.

**Do not expect anything to "happen"**; put yourself in God's hands.


## **Parish Financial Update** St. Mark Catholic Church, Shoreline WA

May 2022

## **Current State**

The parish staff, Finance Council, and Pastoral Council have reviewed our financial situation as we prepare the budget for the new fiscal year beginning on July 1. It's been a tumultuous time for our parish over the last few years, and that's had an impact on our finances. We saw an ex-

pected decrease in donation income when we were prohibited from meeting in person for Mass — and in fact, the decrease during that time was not as bad as it could have been, so THANK YOU to all of you who continued to donate online during this time. However, our donation income has not recovered from that drop. Our ordinary income for this fiscal year is forecast to be \$155K (18%) lower than in 2019. The impact of



this reduced income has been somewhat mitigated by the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP), which provided loans to organizations to enable them to retain employees through the pandemic. Our parish meets the conditions to have these loans forgiven, resulting in additional "income" for the parish: \$167k for the parish, and an additional \$257k for the school. These funds have substantially offset the reduced income in 2020-2022, but the program has ended and we will not be receiving any additional PPP funds. We also received two generous \$100K bequests in our 2020-2022 fiscal years, further offsetting the decrease in ordinary income — but like the PPP funds, we cannot count on such bequests being available in the future.

### Next Year

If the current trend of decreasing donations continues, we are forecasting a deficit of about \$170k in our next fiscal year, primarily resulting from the decreased income. We cannot prudently operate with a deficit of this extent; we would run out of cash in roughly two years. In order to balance our budget, we will need to consider several changes to our plans for the coming year, such as:

- Reducing the amount of the parish subsidy to our school, and pulling additional funds from the school endowment to make up the gap.
- Reducing budgets across most areas of parish operations, including our liturgy, faith formation, and office expenses. Among other impacts, this would result in less funding available for candles, incense, and instrumentalists; increased delays when contacting the parish office; and fewer resources and supplies for our faith formation programs.

## Looking Forward to Our Future

We can reverse the current trend and restore our parish to a healthy financial condition. Increasing our income will require a combination of *both* increasing our membership of active parishioners, and a generous spirit of sacrificial giving. Beyond the direct financial contributions (which are indeed critical!), your contributions of time and talent build up our parish into a more welcoming and engaged community, which draws in new members. This requires active support from ALL parishioners — not just by the pastor, staff, and dedicated group of existing volunteers. Your contributions matter! Please, prayerfully consider where you can contribute more to our parish, and thus do your part to ensure that our reverent liturgy can be celebrated in our beautiful church for many years to come. Your support and engagement is necessary, and it enables our critical mission of spreading the gospel and drawing souls to Christ our Lord!

The new Jerusalem promised by the Bible is not built by human hands but comes as a gift from God. In striving for growth in our families we must remember that ultimate perfection comes only from God.

This week's second reading reveals a "new heaven and a new earth [and] the holy city, a new Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God." (Revelation 21:1-2) In the same way that God spoke first in creation, he also has the last word in presenting us with the holy city.

Our human response to God's initiative has meaning. It communicates openness to receiving life. Yet, we must always understand that our efforts participate in God's ongoing work of creation. This gives us patience and perspective when interacting with our loved ones.

Describe how growth can be a gift:

- Watch for a time when your child is concerned about a lack of growth. Often our children become frustrated when they struggle to learn a skill like playing an instrument. They might even be worried about aspects of their own physical development.
- Ask your child about a time when they learned a new skill or discovered new growth. Invite your child to reflect upon a time when they learned something new. Maybe when they learned to ride a bike. Or maybe when they noticed they had grown. See what your child remembers about the experience. Sometimes they may not even remember what happened. All of a sudden, after trying for a period of time, the skill or growth may have seemed to come of its own accord.
- Remind them that God is continuing his work of creation in them. Often that work happens without us noticing. Let them know that only part of our growth and development comes from our own efforts. As St. Paul said "I planted . . . but God gave the growth." (1 Corinthians 6)
- Wrap up with a reminder of some growth you observed from them recently. Encourage your child by sharing an observation of some growth you observed recently. This example can help remind them to keep trying and remain hopeful.
