

This year **the solemnity of the Epiphany**, celebrated the first Sunday after January 1st, lands on Sunday, January 8. Though Jesus was not born in secret (far from it, what with the choirs of angels proclaiming glory to God and peace to men of good will!), He was known to only a few on that silent night.

However, the coming of the saviour was foretold through Scriptures and anticipated by many, especially those who were watching for the signs that would mark His arrival. We remember the three kings - Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar - who set out to honor Him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrhh.

Traditionally, this day includes the practice of blessing chalk, which will be used to mark the doorways of homes with the initials of the three kings, surrounded by the current year. Together, it would look like this:

20 🗶 C 🛠 M 🛠 B 🛠 23

The initials of the three kings also stand for the phrase *Christus Mansionem Benedicat*, Latin for "May Christ Bless this House." Like the three kings, may we honor Christ in all we do. - Father Jacob Maurer

In anticipation of the solemnity of Epiphany, Saint Mark parish will celebrate **Solemn Vespers (evening prayer) before the vigil Mass on Saturday, January 7**. Vespers will begin at 5:00 pm, with Mass immediately after.
