



WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

If you, O Lord, should mark iniquities, Lord, who could stand? But with you is found forgiveness, O God of Israel.

Cf. Ps 130 (129): 3-4

Today's Gospel is one that provides both low-hanging fruit as well as deeper implications. Since Catholicism isn't an either/or religion but a both/and one, I'll shoot for both!

Anytime this comes up, there's always someone who objects that Jesus accepts everyone where they're at, that expectations are unwelcoming, that external appearance matters little compared to the heart of each individual.

To all of that, I say: sure! How we dress isn't the end-all, be-all of our faith. And also what



we choose to wear

- when we have a
choice (and we don't
always) - reflects
the care that we
have for an event

and the people there. In short: would I wear these clothes to my best friend's wedding, my mother's funeral, a coronation of a king, etc?

Without diminishing that lesson, there is also a deeper reflection to which we are invited: that we are the ones who are not worthy to come to the feast. By sinning, we have participated in the death of the Lord and His servants - we should be the very ones the Lord is destroying!

And yet.... He invites *us* - the very people who deserve the greatest of condemnation. How humbly, how gratefully, how joyfully(!) we ought to approach God - especially at Mass. In all things, let us make sure that we do our part in matching the richness of His goodness.

This Tuesday is the memorial of Saint Ignatius of Antioch. If you pray the Liturgy of the Hours, the Office of Readings contains a letter



to the Romans from Saint Ignatius. Writing about his impending martyrdom, he says something startling:

If I am condemned to suffer, I will take it that you wish me well. If my case is postponed, I can only think that you wish me harm.

Reading through the entire text, one sees how he is not only willing, but *eager* to offer his life on earth to the Lord and join Him in heaven. May we, too, focus our attention heavenward!

Frequently Asked Questions

What are the limits of feedback?

That's a good question. I would say that they were pretty clear with us - and I wish they were a little more transparent about it with the whole archdiocese - that they have a preset number of parish families that they're shooting for. I want to say it's between 60 and 68 families. And the number is exactly based on the projection of how many pastors we'll ultimately have in that 10 year projection. And so they want to have a buffer because even if you're projecting 67 or 70 pastors that number could fluctuate up or down, and we don't want to do this process again.

I will tell you that the configuration change between Saint Mark, Saint Matthew and Saint Luke to the configuration with Saint Matthew and Saint Catherine required them to add a parish family that they did not initially want to add, but did in light of the points that we made.

Is there some place that shows us all the parish family configurations?

In fact, yes! Just today (Saturday, September 23, 2023) the archdiocese sent out an email to pastors that they have now made public the whole list of parish families. We'll be posting that on our parish website and sharing it via email this weekend (click here to view that document).

Is there a set number of parishes to be consolidated per family?

No. There are actually a very small number of parishes that are not being consolidated - or rather, they're each a parish family of one. Those parish families tend to be very specific exceptions. For example, Blessed Sacrament parish is a Dominican-run and owned parish that exclusively serves the local university.

That said, it seems to me that in ordinary circumstances, the diocese is shooting for two or three parishes. When you look at the list, you'll see that most of the parish families are three-parish families. But with a little research (using the official Archdiocesan website), you'll notice that where there are two-parish families, at least one of them will be very large. I'd guess that in those cases, the number of parishes was deliberately limited because of the great number of parishioners already being served between the two parishes.
