Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Peace of our Lord be with each of you!

After a month in Rome for the global synod I was energized, yet eager to return home. Sitting at tables praying and listening to people from around the world was a very intense, prayerful and exhilarating experience. What struck me most was that we were living out a synodal experience of truly listening to understand – not to respond or build upon – but to truly listen to each other and ultimately to listen for the Holy Spirit.

While I was listening for the Holy Spirit at the global synod, the people in the Archdiocese of Seattle were encountering each other and the Holy Spirit during the Partners of the Gospel public input sessions. Using a synodal listening model, these input sessions invited people to pray, listen and share their hopes, fears and ideas related to the proposed parish families.

I am incredibly grateful for the input we received – and humbled by the engagement from the people of God. In all we received over 3,000 pages of feedback from more than 700 input session reports and 800 online responses.

Despite what some may think, we are truly listening. The proposed parish families are in no way "a done deal." In fact, the opposite is true. Your feedback was reviewed extensively. Because of your input, proposed changes emerged for 25 parish families. The parishes that have a possible change will have a second round of consultation in December on the newly proposed parish family configuration.

We pray that the Holy Spirit continues to guide our discernment so that we can follow where God is leading us in this process. Our goal is to encounter Christ, accompany each other and live the joy of the Gospel. As we restructure and renew our parishes, may we be compelled by our Baptismal dignity to live our faith more fully and carry Christ into the world.

I am grateful to everyone who played a role in this historic process – from planning the sessions, training volunteers, leading the small groups, writing the reports and more. Thank you for sharing your time and talents, which are a true gift to your parish community and the local Church.

Again, I give thanks to God for the incredible participation in the consultation process. Thank you for your engagement and continued prayers for this effort. Please keep praying for this renewal effort. As always, I remain,

WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

Dear friends,

In late September we had two fruitful gatherings related to Partners in the Gospel - our Saturday Q&A session and the formal input session the following Thursday. Over one hundred parishioners spread across thirteen groups offered thoughtful feedback coming in at about twenty-one pages. Foremost, I want to share how proud I am of our community's thoughtful and charitable feedback on the proposed family. **Thank you** for taking part in this process so far.

As you heard this weekend - and you can read in the archbishop's letter (attached) - the feedback given by parishioners around the archdiocese has not only been received but carefully considered (click here to read the archdiocesan Feedback Report). The result has been significant changes in more than a third of the parish families, including ours. The new proposed configuration for parish family 12 (a new number!) is Saint Matthew, Saint Mark, and Saint Pius X parishes. The archdiocese has kindly provided a summary of their reasoning, available online (click here).

And our part in this discernment isn't done; the archdiocese would like us to go through a round of feedback for this new proposal. To give the archbishop and his team time to consider the results, they must be submitted by the middle of December. Mindful of both that and upcoming events, we will hold our parish-wide feedback session on **Saturday, December 9th from 11 am to 1 pm in the**



school gymnasium. Please plan on attending - as we have seen, your feedback matters!

You can prepare by reviewing the feedback questions & process from the archdiocese:

- **Round one**: What concerns do I have about the proposed family grouping? What challenges might this pose?
- **Round two**: What hopes do I see in the proposed family grouping? What opportunities or possibilities might this offer?
- Additional feedback: What does or doesn't work with the proposed parish family configuration? What alternatives might the archdiocese consider (and why)?

The archdiocese will also have an online form available for those who can't come to the in-person session. For those who so desire (especially if you can't come on December 9), you may provide feedback directly to the archdiocese (click here). In the meantime, let us continue to pray for each other, the people of the archdiocese, and our archbishop - that we may together discern the call and will of the Lord.

WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

The Lord said: I think thoughts of peace and not of affliction. You will call upon me, and I will answer you, and I will lead back your captives from every place.

Cf. Jer 29: 11, 12, 14

Today's reading from Proverbs is hands down one of my favorites. To modern ears, it may seem chauvinistic, diminishing, or just jarring.

But, if you'll permit me the space of this page, I invite you to consider this passage in a more encouraging light. The first key - as always! - is found in Jesus and His teaching. He proclaims Himself the bridegroom and us (the Church) His. In this light, this passage becomes not a measuring stick for others but ourselves! And



who among us *doesn't* want to be worthy to be forever with the Lord?

That said, despite being fascinated by my mother at her spinning wheel, I'm not particularly good with wool, flax, a distaff, or a spindle. Happily, these

are simply material examples of the true point: that the husband (Jesus) finds himself able to entrust his (Jesus') heart to her (us!) - because she (we) bring him (Jesus) good, and not evil.

And lest we get tripped up about being one who 'fears' the Lord, remember that this is a reference to fear of causing offense, as we would for anyone whom we call 'beloved'.

We ought to desire to be found worthy - not out of a need to prove ourselves, but because we desire to return (even in small part!) the love He gives. May we ask Him to help us join Him in that work of being made worthy.

November 22 is the memorial of Saint Cecilia, virgin and martyr. Patron saint of musicians, she is often depicted with an organ - a reference whose origins have been lost to time. Nonetheless,



some depiction of Saint Cecilia can often be found in Catholic parishes around the world - usually strategically placed near the choir with her and an organ!

Like her, may we hold fast to our faith and praise the Lord in prayer & song. Read more about Saint Cecilia from the Vatican News.

This week we celebrate the American holiday of **Thanksgiving**. Though not (liturgically speaking) a feast of the Church, we nonetheless take this opportunity to praise God for his kindness and ask Him to open our hearts to every person so that we might share His gifts with all.

This strikes me as a wonderful occasion to remind ourselves to make not just a once-ayear offering but a *daily* offering of ourselves

to the Lord and each other. The Church has a wonderful tradition called **the Morning**Offering. Check it out at the USCCB website, and consider making it part of your daily prayers!
