Today is the **Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe**. If that title doesn't emphasize the grandeur of the day, I don't know what will!

In just a week, we enter into the new liturgical year, moving from Ordinary Time to Advent. Before we do, the Church casts Her mind toward the end not only of the year but of all time. Christ is coming!



CCS/CHS 2023 APPEAL FOR THE POOR

WITH TENS OF THOUSANDS OF NEIGHBORS SERVED BY 190 CCS/CHS PROGRAMS IN WESTERN WASHINGTON

2023 CCS/CHS KING COUNTY PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- This fall, CCS/CHS opened **St. Margaret's Place** in Shoreline, 100 new units of Permanent Supportive Housing with 24/7 onsite case-management services for residents transitioning from chronic homelessness to life in the community.
- At our Federal Way and Kent Day Centers, the **Engage Health** program now addresses the crucial health needs of people living unsheltered in South King County thanks to a new partnership with Harborview Medical Center and Seattle/King County Public Health agencies.
- In King County, **Volunteer (Chore) Services** (VS) volunteers provide more than 1,000 hours of service every month to low-income older adults and adults living with disabilities who need a little help from others to remain safe and independent in their own homes. VS coordinators do thorough background checks and interviews to ensure good partners for our vulnerable neighbors.
- The **Kinship Program** will serve approximately 300 kinship families (family members raising family members) this year, with nearly 200 families receiving financial assistance with rent, utilities, and basic needs. Kinship caregivers offer children the chance to stay connected with their family, culture, neighborhood, and school in a home where they are loved and wanted.
- ★ Junction Point shelter moved to a 49-unit Pallet Shelter in North Seattle, offering safe, non-congregate shelter to individuals and couples over 50 years of age experiencing homelessness. Services include electricity, hot meals, showers, laundry facilities, and housing case management.
- ★ KC **Housing and Essential Needs** (HEN) program provides rent and utility assistance, hygiene and cleaning supplies, and ORCA Lift cards to 2,000 adults unable to work due to disability.
- ★ KC opened its new **Transportation and Essential Needs** (TEN) program, in Phoenix House (the former Lazarus Center) on Rainier Avenue, providing services that include ORCA Lift cards and essential needs for 1200 + low-income adults with disabilities.
- New Bethlehem Shelter and Day Programs offer transitional housing and other services to families experiencing homelessness on the East Side. Last year, New Beth welcomed 56 families to their transitional shelter, and 38 are now in their own homes.
- The **Josephinum**, CCS/CHS most extensive low-income housing program, welcomed guests from the Seattle Archdiocese and Providence Healthcare for Days of Caring, structured immersion experiences designed to bring staff into the worlds of the people we serve.

COMMUNITIES OF CONCERN

CCS/CHS actively participates in the **Communities of Concern Commission**, a statewide coalition of Black, Indigenous, and Communities of Color in urban and rural areas disproportionally affected by poverty.

FAMILY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

CCS FBH is a recognized leader and pioneer among state behavioral agencies. This year, FBH hosted child welfare experts and agency leaders from Japan seeking to learn how to better address and prevent child abuse and neglect using programs like our **Wraparound with Intensive Services (WISe)**. 95% of the thousands of children and youth we served last year with intensive mental health treatment, integrated pediatric outpatient services, crisis response, and de-escalation remained safely with their families.

IMMIGRATION

Catholic Charities USA awarded CCSWW two grants in 2023 to provide asylum-seekers in our region with help and support. A \$25,000 grant provided direct financial assistance to clients of CCS' Catholic Immigration Legal Services (CILS). CCSWW divided the second grant of \$350,000 between CILS and 41 parishes providing emergency services and supplies to refugees in their communities.

LONG TERM CARE (LTC)

CCS Long Term Care (LTC). Last year, we served 4,600 homebound elders and others with disabilities, helping to keep people in their homes in all 19 counties of western Washington. This year, thanks in part to CCS LTC advocacy, more low-income clients are benefiting from "the most significant anti-poverty change in Long Term Care in many years:" the increase of their personal needs allowance from 100% to 300% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL).

NETWORK BUILDERS

Every year, **CCS Network Builders** work regionally to support service ministries in our deaneries and parishes, connecting the faithful to the people we serve. This year, CCS Network Builders are finding ways to support parish service ministries as they discern the path ahead through the Partners in the Gospel process.

PREPARES (PREGNANCY AND PARENTING SUPPORT)

One hundred four parish partners have joined the CCSWW **Pregnancy and Parenting Support Program**, offering vulnerable families the promise of support and assistance from pregnancy to their child's fifth birthday, including food, clothing, diapers, parenting classes, and referrals to social services. This year, parish volunteers offered special events including, community baby showers for high school Teen Parent programs, and participation in Welcome Circle Family Days for refugees.
