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# WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?



O sing a new song to the Lord; sing to the Lord, all the earth. In his presence are majesty and splendor, strength and honor in his holy place.

Cf. Ps 96 (95): 1, 6

The two stories in today's readings - of God's call for the people of Ninevah to repent and the Lord's call of the Apostles - have a striking characteristic: the *immediacy* with which people respond. It takes but a single day for an entire city to repent and return to the Lord. It takes but a single invitation from Jesus for Simon, Andrew, James, and John to leave everything and follow Him.

In contrast, it takes me....considerably longer to accept, answer, and go along with the Lord!



Whether it is in failing to attend to God's voice, answering with a simple 'no', or dragging my feet when I reluctantly realize what I'm supposed to be doing.

One of the priest professors at my seminary pointed out that true virtue is when we respond to God *immediately*, *joyfully*, and *generously*. A response that is lacking some or all of those attributes is not necessarily bad - but it is a sure sign that our hearts are still rooted in our own desires instead of God's will.

A good reflection for our daily prayer - especially each evening before we go to bed - is to consider where we saw God prompting us and how we did (or didn't) respond. Let us ask Him to help us to do better each day, so that we may be like Ninevah and the Apostles.

In 2005, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops commissioned



a vocations video titled 'Fishers of Men'. This brief film was part testimonial, part exhortation, part dramatization - all of it was about the call to priesthood and joy of living out that call. I still find it to be a great video!

At our parish, we have resumed praying for vocations to the priesthood from among those in our parish. I would like to commend this video to you as something you might offer to those young men you meet who are discerning - or ought to discern! - God's call.

I've mentioned it before, but I would like to share with you a local convention that is near to my heart: **Doxacon Seattle**. They are a Seattle-based comic convention exploring the intersection of faith and fandom.

In short, its a place for Christians to geek out together about things they love!

This year's convention is fast approaching - it will be on Saturday, February 10th. This year's theme is *At the End of All Things: Utopias, Dystopias, and the Persistence of Hope.* I've always



enjoyed post-apocalyptic stories (I heartily recommend *World War Z* and *A Canticle for Leibowitz*), so it looks to be fun! Check them out at www.doxaconseattle.com

January 21, 2024 From the desk of the pastor

Dear friends,

Last week I shared with you five areas of need that are foremost on my mind for the good of our community and the incoming priests. This week I would like to share a little more about the role of daily Mass sacristans.

It seems to me that sometimes folks hear the title of a given ministry and are immediately put off - 'surely that is something only *holy* people can do!' is a common reaction, even if only internally. While we are all SURELY called to holiness, we're also all sinners - and we can do good even as we work towards perfection.

While a sacristan is indeed someone who assists with the Mass - they might be best described as the butler for the Mass! Theirs is to unlock a few doors, set up the various things that will be used that day, and clean up afterwards. During the Mass - and only if something unusual comes up unexpectedly - they might also briefly assist by bringing out extra supplies or taking away something that broke or cleaning up a spill.

In short, if you have ever served dinner at your house - or at a restaurant, for that matter - you are **well** equipped to serve as a sacristan.

To help de-mystify sacristan work, I've put together a 10-step guide to daily Mass sacristan duties. I'm listing those duties here, but there's a fuller handout for anyone who is interested. I hope many of you will take a look at this ministry, see how do-able it is, and consider how you might join in this simple (but important!) way of assisting at daily Masses here at Saint Mark parish.

#### Daily Mass sacristan work in 10 easy steps:

#### Setup

#### Clean-up

- 1. Unlock the front doors
- 2. Turn on all the lights
- 3. Open the work sacristy
- 4. Set up the lectionary (readings book)
- 5. Set up the Roman Missal (prayers book)
- 6. Prepare the vessels, altar cloths, and vestments
- 7. Light the candles

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8. Update the hymn board numbers

- 9. Clear the altar & put out the candles
- 10. Close/lock the building
