

₩JMJ ★ WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

Save us, O Lord our God! And gather us from the nations, to give thanks to your holy name, and make it our glory to praise you.

"What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us?" These words of the man with an unclean spirit might well express the anxieties and fears of every human heart. Who doesn't wonder if Jesus' healing might come at too high a cost.

In C.S. Lewis' *The Great Divorce*, one great passage depicts a man who is entrapped by a lizard of lust that sits on his shoulder, whispering evil into his ear. An angel approaches him, offering to help. The man hates the lizard, but as the angel approaches to silence it, he is overcome with fear. Will the death of the lizard kill *him*? Even if he survives, will the pain be too much to bear?

The angel offers him assurances that no, he will not die - though it will not be without pain. Nonetheless, that terrible uncertainty in the moment of decision holds the man captive for no small amount of time until he finally makes his desperate decision. I won't spoil the story for you, but I highly recommend the whole book.

This lesson is one that we need to revisit regularly - and especially in this time of discernment as we face future changes in our parish with *Partners in the Gospel*. Though we may have fears similar to the man in today's reading and in C.S. Lewis' story, we know how it ends: Jesus triumphs over sin & death - and does it for us! May we place our trust in Him, allowing & inviting Him to work in and among us so that we might be healed & restored. Saint John Bosco whose memorial is this Wednesday - is known for his care for orphans and the founding of the Salesians.

Inspired by Saint Francis de Sales (whose memorial



was last week Wednesday), he dedicated himself to preaching and service. Due to the nationalist movement in Italy at the time, he faced great opposition - there were even assassination attempts on his life! By the time he died in 1888, 250 houses were established serving 130,000 children before his death.

Last Monday - January 22 - was our annual **Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children**. Though originally oriented towards the overturning of *Roe vs. Wade*, the work of building a culture of life is no less urgent - though there have been victories in courts, we have much to do to touch the hearts of our fellow citizens.

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has a website with many, many resources - <u>www.respectlife.org</u>. I found one of the prayers that they share there to be

especially affecting: <u>an appeal to St.</u> <u>Joseph</u>. Let us continue to pray for the protection of all human life.





₩JMJ¥ WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

Dear friends,

We are continuing through the details of my appeal for help in the five areas most on my mind for the good of our community and the incoming priests. This week I would like to share a little more about the role of **lectors**.

Let's put it out there: getting in front of people can be *hard*. But the great benefit of the Mass is that ministers are NEVER making it up as they go. From start to finish, there is a script that guides us in our words, actions, and posture. The Church has gone to extraordinary lengths to help us have confidence in both what we're doing and *how* we do it.

Though a lector is in front of everyone, it's not about them. Theirs is to proclaim the Word of God and lead us in praying for the intentions of the universal Church & our local community. Lectors have 3-5 duties at Mass: processing in with altar servers & priest with the Book of the Gospels, reading the first reading from the Old Testament, reading the second reading from the New Testament, and leading the petitions. Notice, by the way, what a lector is *not*: they're not a performer! Though there is room for enunciation and natural emphasis within a passage, the lector is proclaiming - not performing - the Scriptures.

By the by, those of you who are quick with numbers will notice that that is only four things. This is because sometimes - not often, but sometimes - we don't have a cantor to lead us in singing the psalm. In those cases, the lector will lead us in the psalm (spoken, not sung).

In addition to being able to read clearly and articulately, our bishop requires that all lectors must be baptized and confirmed Catholics.

Saint Mark parish provides an annual publication (<u>The St. Joseph Handbook for Lectors &</u> <u>Proclaimers of the Word</u>). This provides all of the readings - with pronunciation guides for difficult words & names - along with practical tips, and reflections to help a person understand what it is they're reading.

If you're wondering - yes, we DO have extra copies, waiting for (new!) lectors to join in this integral liturgical ministry! I hope many of you will prayerfully consider being a lector at Sunday (or daily) Masses here at Saint Mark parish.
