# → WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

Arise, Jerusalem, and look to the East and see your children gathered from the rising to the setting of the sun.

Though revealed to shepherds and His adoptive parents, the solemnity of the Epiphany marks the revealing of Jesus to the world. Long-sought, He is found by the magi who, having traveled far with only a star to guide them, bring gifts to the Child-King.



One of my favorite Christmas carols is <u>a</u> rendition of 'Little Drummer Boy' performed by the a capella group Pentatonix. Repeating a question that lays in every heart, the titular boy wonders what he could possibly offer the Lord. And for the Lord to smile at his gift, to delight in even the smallest offering - of course the little boy (and we with him) rejoices!

While our own gifts may vary (no drums at Mass, please!) there is something to be said for presenting to God whatever we have at hand. Regardless of whether or not *we* think it's enough, the Lord will happily receive our gifts.

All of this begs the question: what can we - what *ought* we - give to the Lord? May we reflect and act on this invitation from Him! Monday (January 8) is the **solemnity of the Baptism of the Lord**. With this celebration, our focus moves

from the Nativity of the Lord to His public ministry - and so we move from the season of Christmas into Ordinary Time.

Jesus' baptism - necessary not for His sake, but ours - inaugurated the sacrament of baptism. With it, He began to proclaim the Gospel to the world. Let us reflect on His baptism and ours, allowing what we have received to shine forth in our own works.

This weekend there will be blessed chalk available for those who wish to take part in the Epiphany house blessing with chalk. This (relatively!) modern practice has its roots in Scripture itself - when the Israelites marked their own homes with the blood of a lamb as part of Passover (see Exodus 12)

As with the Israelites, we use chalk to mark our doorways - remembering the three saints who brought gifts to Christ (Casper, Melchior, and Balthasar) and invoking God's blessing upon our homes & all who live there or visit.

### Epiphany house blessing w/ chalk

It has been a tradition in the Catholic Church to bless chalk at the Masses for Epiphany, using the blessed chalk as part of blessing one's home in the New Year.

The home blessing can be done as follows: Use the blessed chalk to write:

### 20+C+M+B+24

above the doorways: 2024 for the year; C, M, B for the 3 Magi – Casper, Melchior, and Balthasar – and for *Christus Mansionem Benedicat*, Latin for "May Christ Bless this House."

As you are writing, pray one of the following prayers:

May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find Christ living among us; and may we seek and serve, in everyone we meet, that same Jesus who is Lord, forever and ever. Amen.

#### or

Lord God of heaven and earth, you revealed your only-begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star. Bless this house and all who inhabit it. Fill us with the light of Christ, that our concern for others may reflect your love. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

or

Lord our God, bless this household. May we be blessed with health, goodness of heart, gentleness, and the keeping of your law. We give thanks to you, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen.

₩JMJ★ WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

Dear friends,

As we enter into the new year - and shortly now, the new liturgical season (Ordinary Time) - I invite you to join me in an effort to bolster and revitalize our parish. Especially in light of *Partners in the Gospel* and aware that I will be leaving at the end of June, with a new pastor and parochial vicar coming in July, now is the time to look critically at how God is calling us to grow.

One of the biggest areas of growth that we need in our parish is in the area of *engagement*. Parishioners of Saint Mark parish often speak with great pride in her history - and rightly so! Long-time members speak of thriving devotion to Eucharistic adoration, regular social events (dinners, dances, etc), and a wide variety of parish groups, gatherings, and opportunities. Sadly, the struggles of recent years - especially during the pandemic - have changed the landscape of our parish community & life.

However, before we reflect on what we as a parish might **DO** about this, I want to emphasize what we as a parish **ARE** - and to do that, I want to highlight what we are *not*:

- Saint Mark parish is *not* its priest. Influential though they may be, priests serve to exhort, build up, and support the community - they are stewards, not rulers, of the community.

- Saint Mark parish is *not* its music or liturgy. Though we treasure the riches of Church music & liturgies, there is room for legitimate variety.

- Saint Mark parish is *not* its customs & practices. While we are informed and (rightly!) influenced by the way things have been, we must strive to be open to where God is leading us.

- Saint Mark parish is *not* its school, choir, elders, youth, volunteers, or any other 'important' group. All of these are important parts of our community, but are parts - not the whole.

Saint Mark parish is - to quote canon law - a certain community of the Christian faithful stably constituted in a particular church (CIC 515 §1). In short, if you walk through these doors with any regularity, **YOU** are what make Saint Mark parish what it is.

So here is the question: what do YOU want to make of Saint Mark parish? 'The way they've always been' - even if that was desireable (it isn't!), isn't possible. But by the grace of God and open to His Spirit, we can choose how we will grow - and discover anew - as a community of Christians here at this church. All that is lacking is our engagement with the Lord and this community He gives us. Let us prayerfully consider how God is calling us to (re)engage with Him and each other here at Saint Mark parish.
