



+ February 2, 2024 - The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

May the peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with each of you! Today we celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. This feast commemorates a milestone in the life of Jesus and the fulfillment of the hopes of two people, Simeon and Anna, who longed to see the Messiah. We know their hope and that of all Israel was fulfilled beyond their wildest dreams.

As I write to you today, I am aware of how we are reaching a milestone in our life together in the Archdiocese of Seattle. We have embarked on our own journey of hope and renewal as partners in the Gospel, centered on the same person of Jesus Christ.

After more than a year of careful planning and broad consultation, I am pleased to announce our final parish families today. You can see the <u>final list</u> on the Archdiocese of Seattle's website (archseattle.org). These parish families will go into effect on July 1st under the leadership of a pastor and one or more parochial vicars. These pastors and parochial vicars will be announced this spring.

I am so grateful to the thousands of people who engaged in the consultation process by providing insights during the input phase, sharing new ideas and praying for this renewal effort. Together we are truly partners in the Gospel and this re-envisioning work could not be accomplished without you. Your input made a significant impact on how the parish families were configured. We took into consideration many factors including size, location, language needs, the presence of a school, key ministries and much more. We spent hours in deep discussions and prayer while listening to the Holy Spirit and discerning our path for the future.

The final step before promulgating these new parish families was to take the results of all the input once again to prayer. I made a retreat in early January keeping all of you in my heartfelt prayers, asking for the Lord's blessing and ongoing guidance in our efforts to carry out the mission of the Church more effectively today. I experienced a profound and sustained sense of consolation during this retreat, giving me the final confidence to make these decisions for implementation.

In baptism, the Risen Jesus shares his divine life with us, as well as a share in the responsibility for the mission of the Church – his mission. Because of the dignity of our baptism, all of us carry the responsibility to help others encounter Christ, to walk together on the journey of faith, to proclaim the Gospel and to glorify God by our lives. This mission is larger than any one of us – or any one

parish. This mission of Jesus, our mission, we fulfill together as members of the living Body of Christ, the Church.

My hope is that parish families will benefit from the shared gifts of people, time, finances, talents and more so that we, as partners in the Gospel, can truly renew parish life. We need every member of the Church to share their God-given gifts to build up the Body of Christ. Imagine more young people on fire with the faith, more people encountering Christ in the sacraments, more robust outreach ministries serving the marginalized, and churches that are full every Sunday and Holy Days to give praise and thanks to God. This is all possible, and I believe Partners in the Gospel is the key to making it happen.

Thank you for making this journey with me. I know the road ahead will have its twists and turns, and may seem long and rugged at times, but the Lord will always be there as our companion and guide.

My friends, our future is filled with hope – the same hope that filled Simeon and Anna and the Holy Family that day in the temple. I pray the Holy Spirit continues to grace us with openness, strength, and courage to live into our future together. Please be assured of my continued prayers for you, and please pray for me and for our Catholic Church in Western Washington. As always, I remain,

Final Parish Families

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WHY DO CATHOLICS DO THAT?

O come, let us worship God and bow low before the God who made us, for he is the Lord our God.

Cf. Ps 95 (94): 6-7

"He approached, grasped her hand, and helped her up." (Mark 1:31)

In a recent conversation with some parishioners, we were discussing the intimacy of physical touch - something that is often taken for granted. Sometimes being hugged or held is exactly what we need, while at other times even a slight touch (say, a hand on the shoulder) is too much for the moment. Either way, that contact is something deeply personal.

With all of this in mind, we can perhaps better



appreciate what the Lord is offering here. Certainly, He is offering healing to Peter's mother - of a kind that is neither alien nor

remote but rather deeply personal: Jesus grasps her hand and helps her up.

Across the prayers of today's Mass are words of the Lord's unfailing care sustaining us in our frailty so that we may be one with Christ and joyfully bear fruit for the world's salvation. All of this is possible by the power of God - but it starts with our willingness to receive His help!

It may be especially helpful for us to consider: 'when was the last time I asked for assistance personally - the last time I *accepted* help from someone else without resistance or pride?' Recognizing our need for Jesus, let us ask and receive, for our good and that of the world.

This Saturday, February 10, is the memorial of Saint Scholastica, sister to Saint Benedict and founder of the Benedictine nuns



One of my favorite stories of her is repeated in today's Office of Readings. She wanted her brother to stay and continue talking about holy things. When he wouldn't, she prayed - and God sent a thunderstorm! When he complained, she replied "you would not listen; so I asked my God and he did listen." May we imitate her trust in and love of God!

This coming weekend (February 10-11) I will be away for the annual Doxacon Seattle - a Christian convention exploring faith & fandom. Though there are many fan conventions - quite a few right here in Washington state! - there are not so many *Christian* fan conventions. I am happy to report that Doxacon Seattle is both faith-filled and very, very geeky. If you enjoy science fiction and fantasy, you'll enjoy them!

February 4, 2024 From the desk of the pastor

Dear friends,

This weekend the archbishop officially announced his final decisions on the parish families across the archdiocese - the fruit of the process that was formally begun almost exactly a year ago. In addition to our own internal reflection & prayer, we now enter into a period of consideration and preparation. Already our staff and councils are considering what areas of focus might be most helpful to our community and the incoming priests - more on that in the coming weeks.

One of the things that can be done **now** is to continue to both *discern* and *respond* to the more immediate needs of Saint Mark community. This week I would like to draw your attention to the invaluable role of **volunteer coordinators**.

For most folks, the idea of being 'in charge' elicits a strong reaction: either deep excitement or deep anxiety. In the life of the Church, this need not be the case! The principles of solidarity (sharing in common our burdens, sorrows, and joys) and subsidiarity (working at the most local level possible) guide the work of the Church universal and individual parishes. In short, we help each other out and keep things as simple as possible!

Volunteer coordinators - working with the pastor and within his vision for a given ministry - are generally responsible for communication between volunteers (scheduling, primarily) and the occasional training, where necessary. For instance, the main work of a volunteer coordinator in charge of lectors would simply be to draft a schedule, send it out to the lectors, and adjust it according to their feedback before finalizing it. As new lectors volunteer, they would walk them through how to read at Mass, use the microphone, and make sure they have a lector guidebook.

In short, volunteer coordination is fairly simple work - but extraordinarily helpful! Saint Mark parish is in need of this kind of help in three areas: lector coordination, daily Mass sacristans coordination, and social hour supplies coordination.

By the way, these are all areas that are currently being done by yours truly - a sign of how desperately we need help! Please prayerfully consider if you - or even a few of you! - might assist in one of these areas.
